

20 NEW PIECES OF COMPLETE BOLLOCKS FROM 2024

Agesplaining: 1. Adjusting the way you talk when addressing older people. 2. Interesting new take on older people condescending those younger than them; in an increasingly ageist world, many younger people assume that those older than them are thick as a brick, when they usually aren't.
